A meeting of the Water Committee of the Salt River Project Agricultural Improvement and Power District (the District) convened at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, June 16, 2026, from the Hoopes Board Conference Room at the SRP Administration Building, 1500 North Mill Avenue, Tempe, Arizona. This meeting was conducted in-person and via teleconference in compliance with open meeting law guidelines. The District and Salt River Valley Water Users' Association (the Association) are collectively known as SRP.

Committee Members present at roll call were R. Arnett, Chair; S. Williams, Vice Chair; K. Clark, M. Harlan, K. Johnson, K. Mohr-Almeida, and K. O'Brien; and L. Rovey of the Association.

Chair R. Arnett called the meeting to order.

Consent Agenda

Chair R. Arnett requested a motion for Committee approval of the Consent Agenda, in its entirety.

Evaporation Study Related to Solar Over Canals

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Bob Pane, SRP Director of Water Engineering and Transmission, stated that the purpose of the presentation was to provide information regarding SRP's work with Arizona State University (ASU) in measuring evaporation in the canal system as it related to solar over canals. They provided an overview, together with images, of each of the following solar over canal projects: 1) Narmada Canal – Gujarat, India; 2) Casa Blanca Canal – Gila River Indian Reservation, Arizona; and 3) the Turlock Irrigation District – Central Valley of California (San Joaquin Valley).

B. Pane said that SRP's approach to solar over canals led to an internal study in early 2022, and summarized the potential benefits and concerns identified by the study. They discussed safety concerns and canal related incidents that occurred in SRP's canals in 2025.

B. Pane presented a map and aerial images of the following two pilot project locations that were considered: Site Option1 – PERA Club and Site Option 2 – Arizona Falls. They reviewed the following data that was presented with respect to the proposed pilot projects: typographies, construction estimates, cost comparison, and 2024 levelized cost comparison.

B. Pane reviewed the evaporation study performed by SRP and ASU, the study methodology, examples of sensor installations, evaporation findings, and the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) – Water Loss Components based on SRP 2025 chart. They concluded with a recap of the Water Committee's recommendation on April 22, 2025, and next steps.

B. Pane responded to questions from the Committee.

SRP Biochar Initiative

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Elvy Barton, SRP Senior Manager of Water and Forest Sustainability, stated that the purpose of the presentation was to provide information regarding SRP's Biochar Initiative and Biochar Initial Adopters Program, which is a part of SRP's forest health efforts.

E. Barton provided the number of acres burned by forest fires from 1975 through 2024 and discussed the effects on the watersheds. They detailed the consequences of high-intensity fires

E. Barton reminded the Committee of SRP's forest health goal to increase SRP's leadership role in forest restoration treatments through partnerships, influence, education, and support for industry to thin 800,000 acres total by 2035.

E. Barton provided background on biochar and summarized the benefits, challenges, Request for Proposals (RFP), and the SRP Biochar Initial Adopters Program. They concluded with a discussion regarding next steps.

E. Barton responded to questions from the Committee.

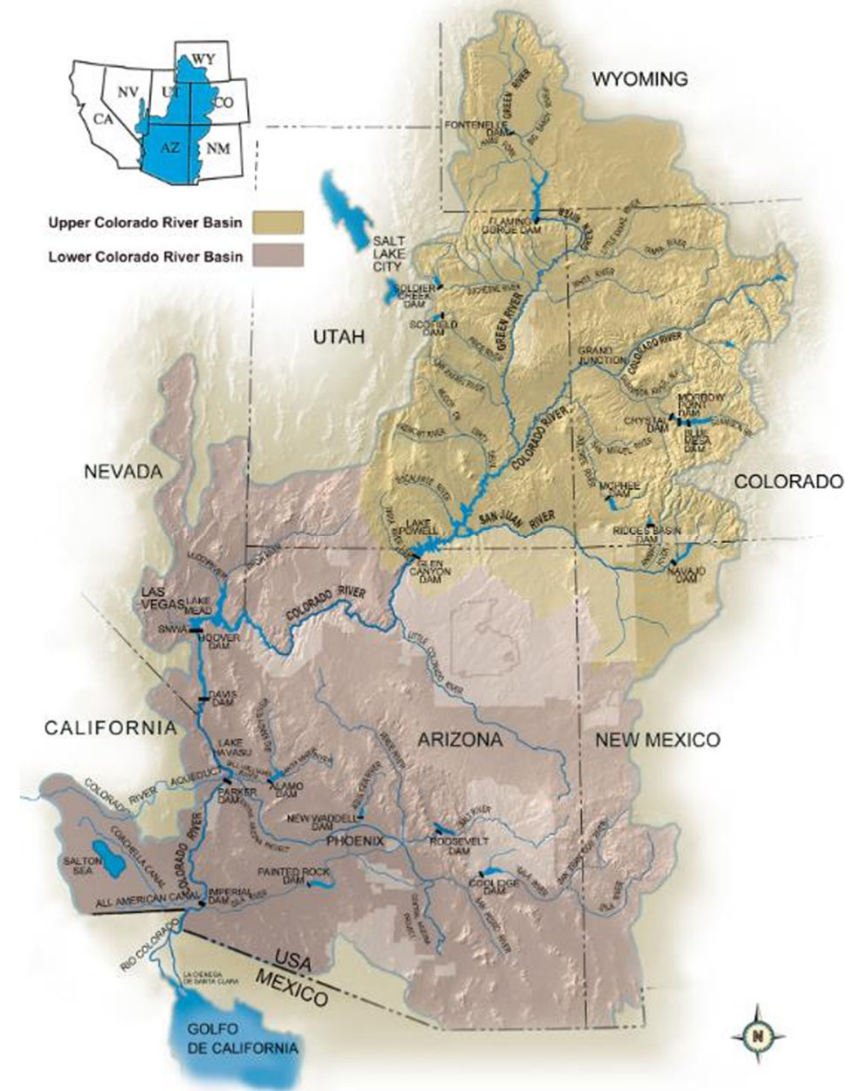

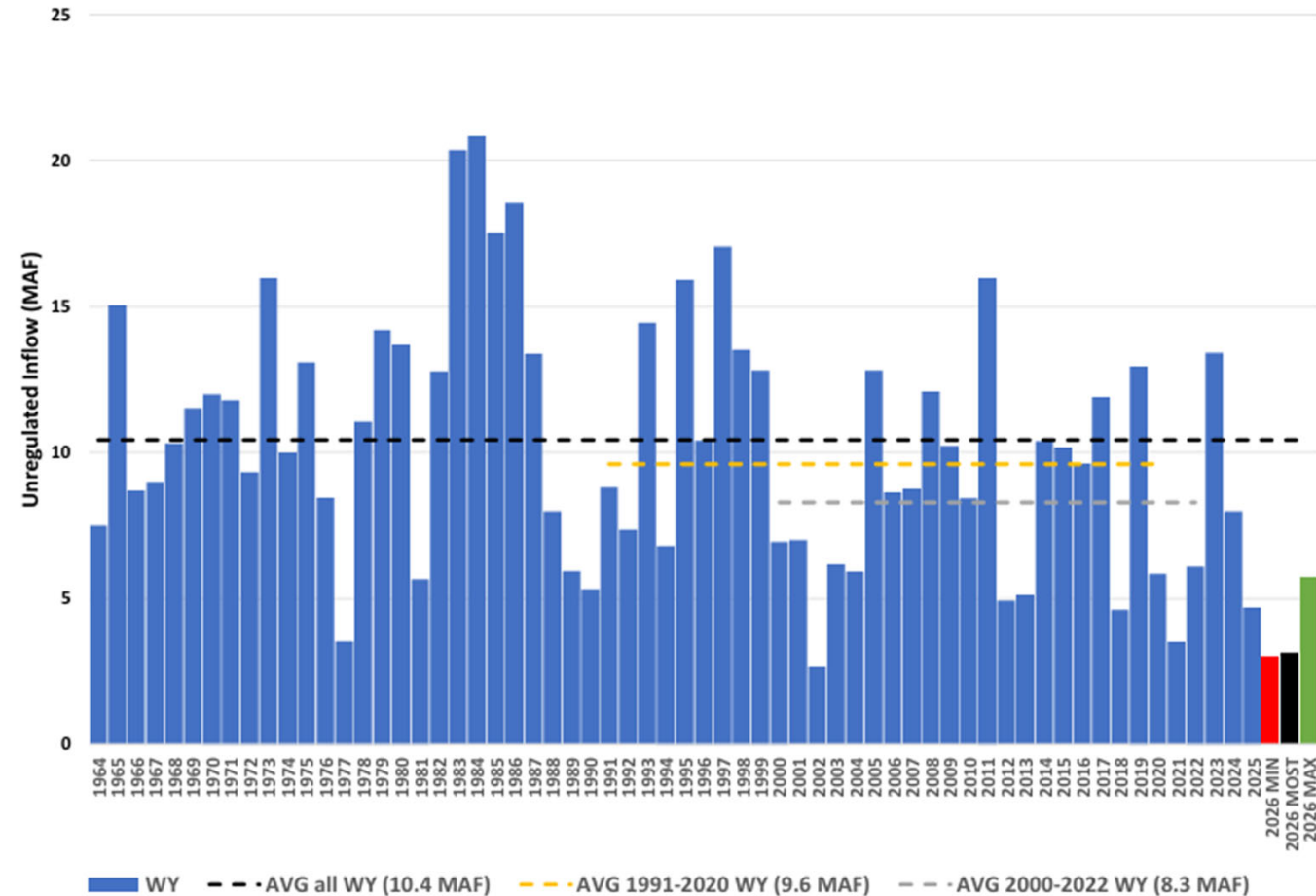
- Colorado River supply and demand remains out of balance over the long-term

Demand Still Exceeds Supply

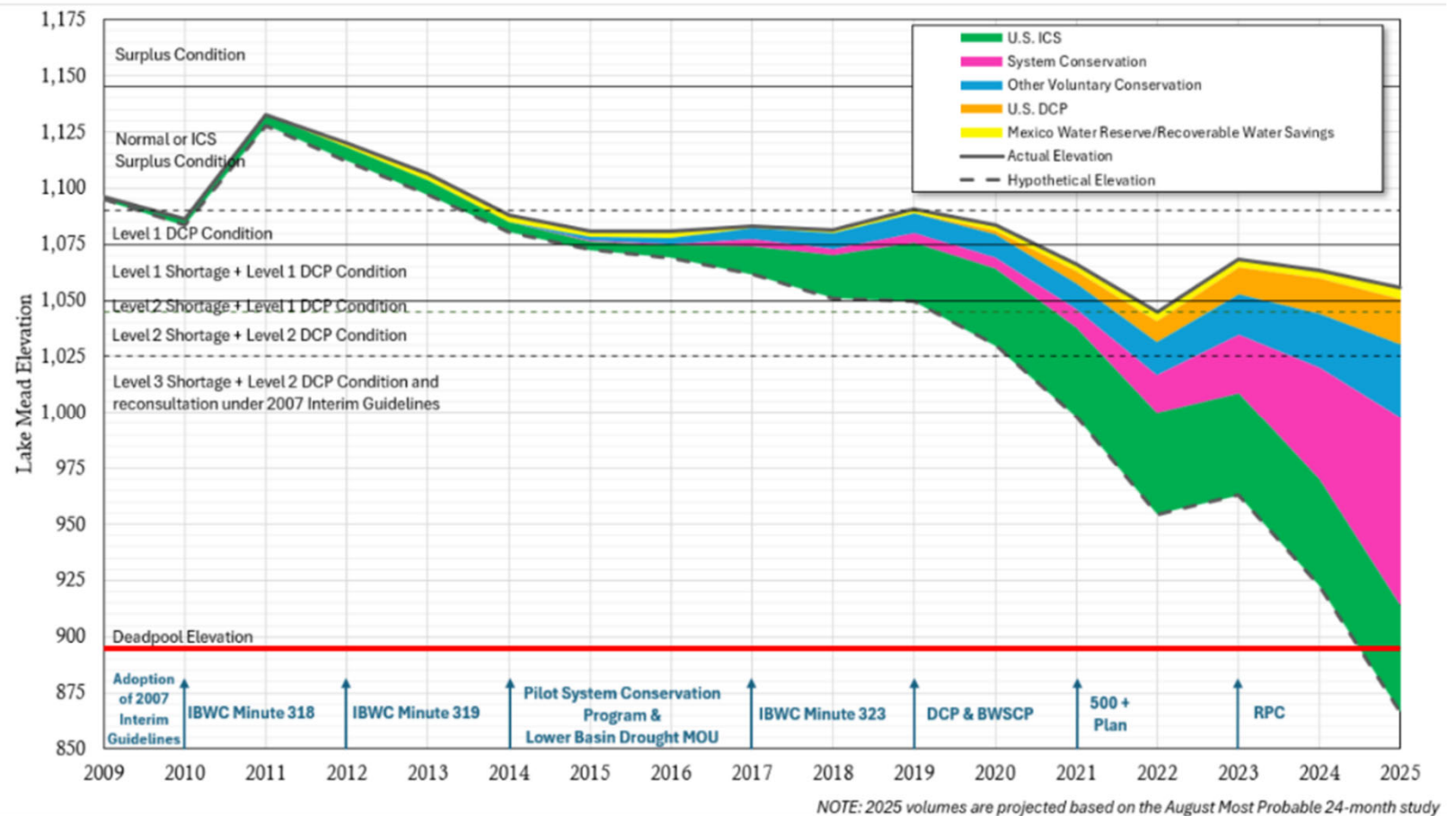
Unregulated Inflow to Lake Powell by Water Year (1964-2026)



- Basin water use was built around wetter conditions
- Long-term aridification is reducing runoff
- Higher temperatures are lowering river yields
- Less water is available than historical assumptions anticipated

- Existing operating agreements expire December 2026
- Basin states were unable to reach consensus
- Bureau of Reclamation released a federal operating framework
- Adaptive management approach through 2036



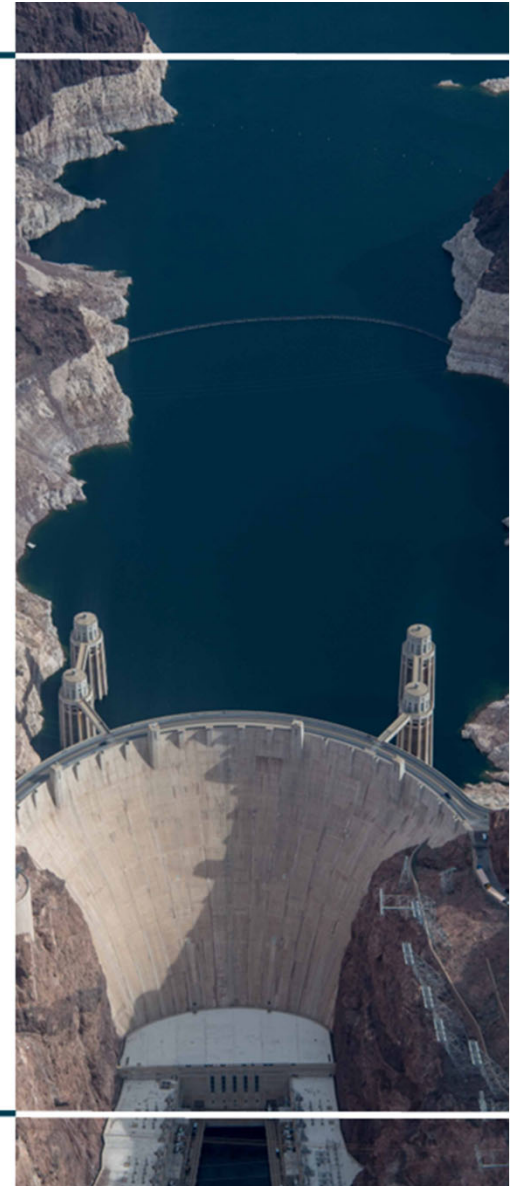

Protecting Critical Infrastructure

- Protect operations at Glen Canyon Dam
- Protect operations at Hoover Dam
- Maintain release capability during low reservoir conditions
- Infrastructure constraints are increasingly driving decisions



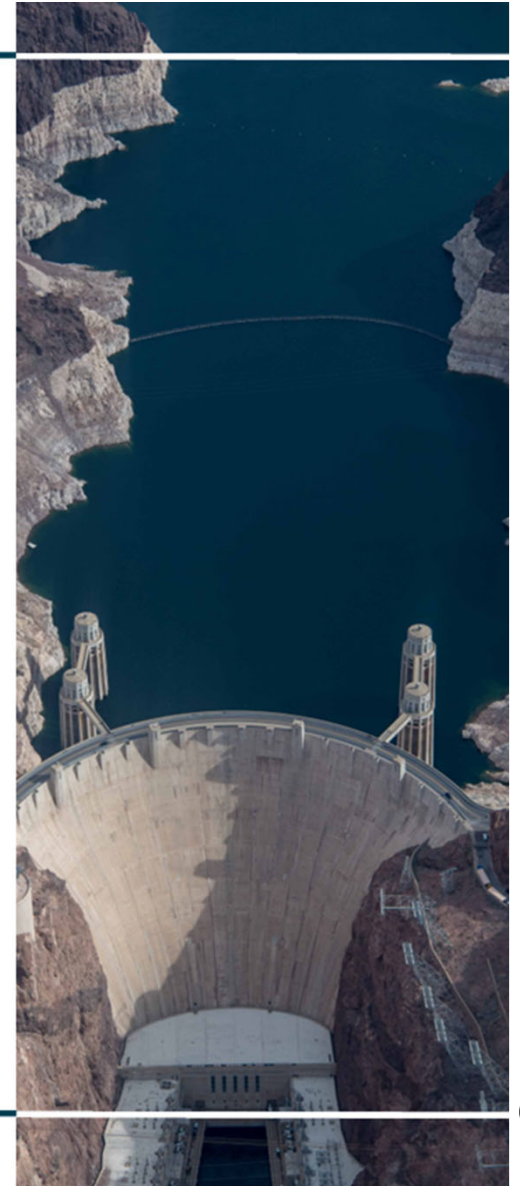
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How the New Operating Framework Works

Post-2026 Operations: Decision Framework, Not Fixed Rules



Protecting Lake Powell & Lake Mead

Reservoir Protection Drives Operations

LAKE POWELL

- Maintain minimum power generation capability
- Preserve release capability
- Utilize Upper Basin reservoir operations when needed
- Avoid approaching critical infrastructure thresholds

LAKE MEAD

- Maintain delivery capability
- Avoid low-elevation infrastructure risks
- Balance storage between reservoirs
- Trigger Lower Basin conservation and shortages as conditions decline

Protecting infrastructure increasingly establishes the operating limits for the river.

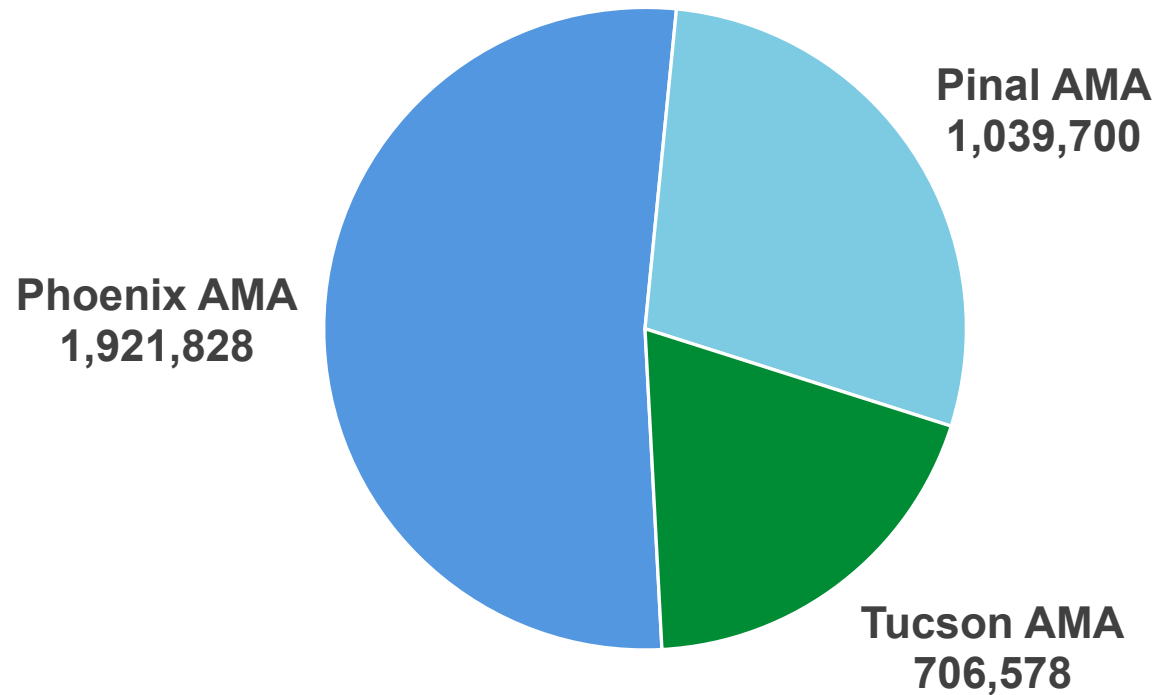
Arizona Colorado River – Priority System

Sixth Priority	Entitlements to surplus.
Fifth Priority	Entitlements to unused Arizona entitlement or unused apportionment water.
Fourth Priority	Entitlements (i) entered into after September 30, 1968 for use on Federal, State, or privately-owned lands in the State of Arizona (for a total quantity of not to exceed 164,652 acre-feet per year); and (ii) CAP Contract No. 14-06-W-245, as amended dated December 15, 1972. Entitlements in (i) and (ii) are coequal.
Third Priority	Entitlements pursuant to contracts executed on or before September 30, 1968.
Second Priority	Secretarial Reservations and Perfected Rights established or effective prior to September 30, 1968.
First Priority	Present Perfected Rights (PPRs) existing as of June 25, 1929, as recognized in the Consolidated Decree in <i>Arizona v. California</i> .

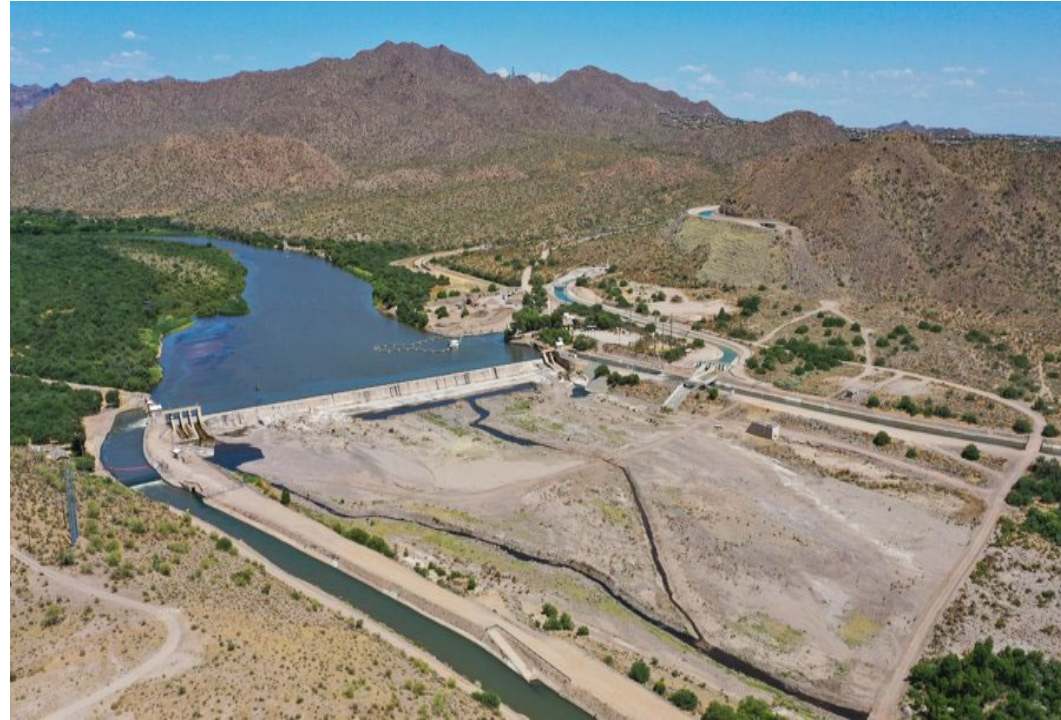

What is NEPA?

National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA)

- Signed into law on January 1, 1970
- Created in response to public sentiment that federal agencies should evaluate environmental impacts
- NEPA requires federal agencies to assess the environmental effects of their proposed actions prior to making decisions
- Federal agencies prepare Environmental Impact Statements (EIS) to evaluate the effects



NEPA Process

Environmental Milestones

Notice of Intent (NOI)

- NOI anticipated to be published in the Federal Register Fall 2026
- Official EIS 2-year 'clock' begins

Public Scoping

- 30-day public scoping period begins
- Scoping Letters concurrent with NOI
- 4 Public Scoping Meetings Planned

Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)

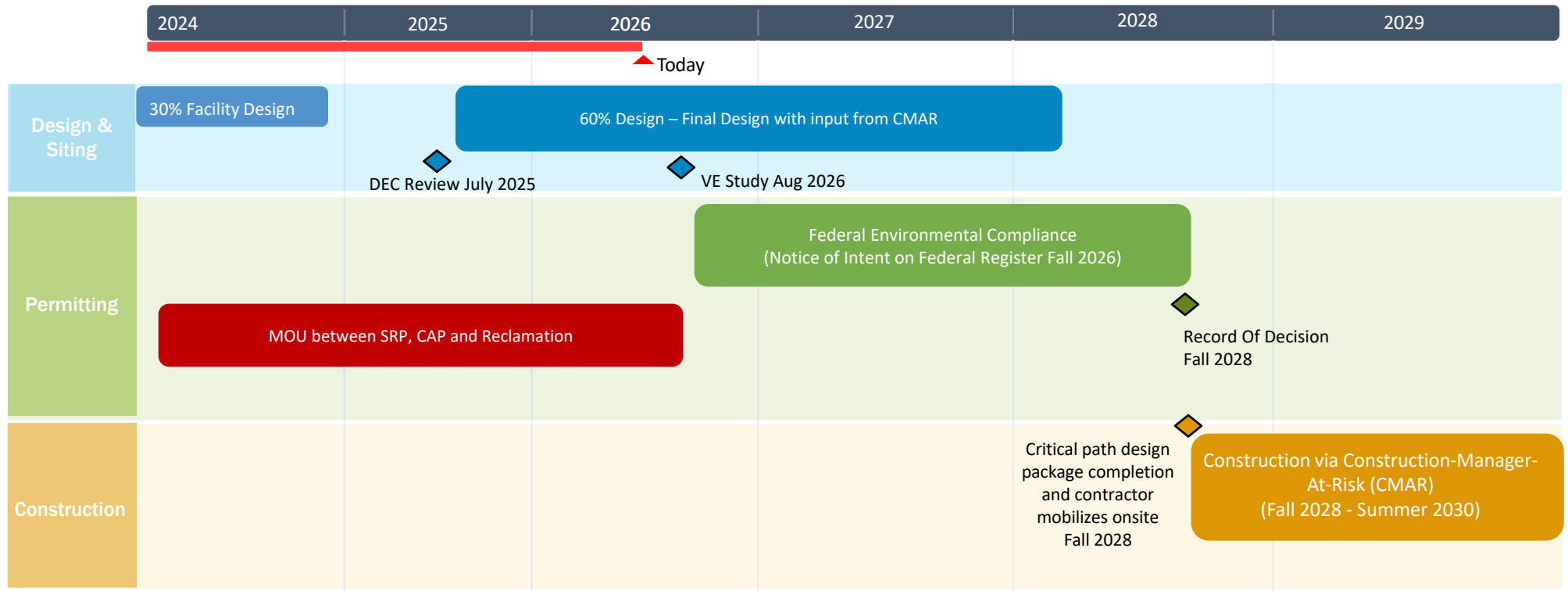
- SRP and our consultant are preparing the statement evaluating the environmental impacts of the proposed federal actions

- Draft EIS available for 45-day public review and comment
Anticipated Fall 2027

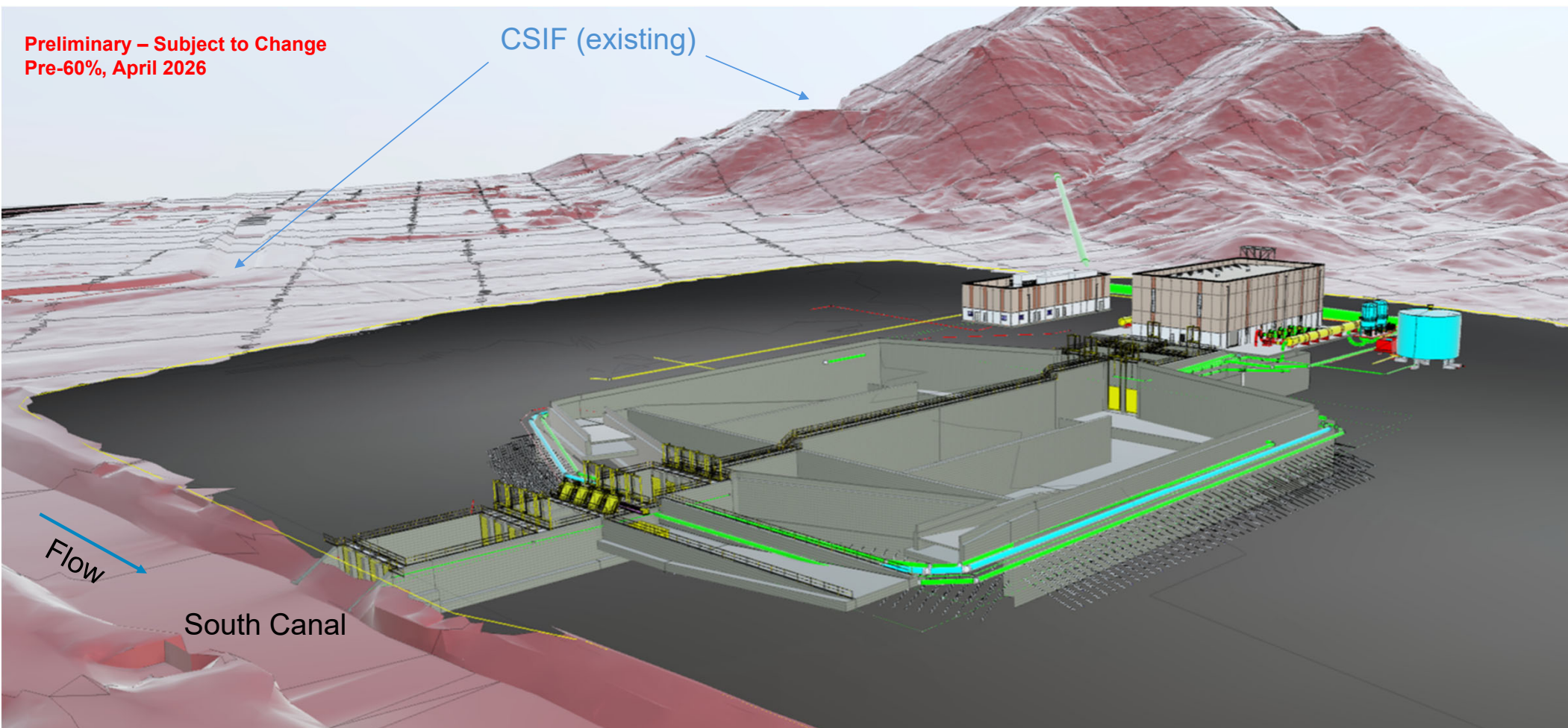
